#### COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will introduce students to the law governing corporations. Topics will include an overview of the rights and obligations of directors, officers, and shareholders; the structure of the state and federal systems applicable to corporations; and the financial and operational organization of corporations.

#### **COURSE FORMAT**

This course is delivered through a mix of online asynchronous lectures and seven (7) live lectures.

## COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Upon completing this course, students will be able to:

- Understand the vocabulary of business law cases and corporate transactions;
- Apply business law cases and statutes to novel fact patterns;
- Understand some of the central policy concerns in business law, and how business law policies may affect the economy and society;
- Appreciate and think critically about the different benefits and costs associated with different forms of business associations; and
- Demonstrate the ability to identify and understand legal issues in business law fact patterns and apply the appropriate rules and standards to solve them.

# **Course & University Policies**

## ATTENDANCE POLICY

Because this is partially an online course, you are expected to participate in all of the discussions and complete your assignments and exam at the designated times. Live sessions are not mandatory but recordings should be reviewed afterward if you cannot attend live.

UF Law respects students' observance of religious holidays. Deadlines for each assignment will be given in advance, and students are expected to meet them. Late assignments will automatically lose 10% for each day they are late. Some consideration, however, may be given at the discretion of the instructor if there are extenuating circumstances; however, you need to notify the instructor before the deadline is missed, not after the fact.

Assignments – There will be three (3) assignments throughout the course, each worth 100 points. The goal for these assignments is to get hands-on experience with the topics covered in the modules and apply what you've learned to real-life scenarios.

*Quizzes* – You will have a total of seven (7) quizzes, each consisting of twenty (20) questions. Students shall be permitted to use notes and material, however, the assistance of another student and/or online searches are strictly forbidden. The quizzes will need to be completed within the allotted week period provided. Once accessed, you will be given 30 minutes to complete each quiz.

Exam – The final exam will consist of fifty (50) questions and will be cumulative, meaning it will test on ALL MODULES. Question formats *may* include: fill in the blank, multiple choice, multiple response, and true/false. Students shall be permitted to use notes and material, however, the assistance of another student and/or online searches are strictly forbidden. The exam will need to be completed between the time period of April 21-27. Once accessed you will be given 60 minutes to complete the exam.
