Angela is part of the Tax Clinic, so she works closely with students. She guides and helps manage cases with them.

11. Syllabus:

Angela follows the Tax Clinic's syllabus and course.

12. Analysis of course materials:

Angela's materials are appropriate for the Tax Clinic.

13. Other comments:

This was Angela's first time teaching in a traditional classroom lecture format. She did a fantastic job. She had a thorough and well-prepared lesson on the process of filing a case in federal court. She used lecture and dialogue with the students, focusing on the students who are representing this particular client.

Angela used a Power Point as guiding material for the lecture. It was well organized and easy to follow. She embedded information for the class itself, but also resources students could use to file their own cases when they are practicing.

Angela began with a review of how and why this case could be filed. In doing so, she touched on jurisdiction, venue, and the basis for the client's claim against the IRS. She talked to the students about the challenge of knowing which government entity to sue, how to make those determinations, real-time shifts based on recent shifts in government agencies, and which entities needed to be served and/or put on notice.

Angela also discussed how the client would file their complaint, including how to proceed in forma pauperis. She then walked the students through the actual process of filing the complaint that had already been prepared in federal court. I am not even sure the students realize how valuable this was for them. It was a perfect example of how doctrine translates into practice, how to navigate a court's local rules, and all the challenges of dealing with government forms. For me, the lesson was a good reminder of the value of clinical teaching, and the importance of exposing students to real world skills.

Angela has a great presence in front of the classroom and you can see she is enthusiastic about helping the students learn, and about the subject. When technology failed her for a moment (as it often does), she was able to pivot and move forward. She also did a great job asking questions and pausing, waiting for students to answer rather than simply answering her own questions.

Overall, Angela is an engaging, well-prepared instructor. She is a valuable addition to the clinical program.

The professor, a Florida Cabinet officer, is available after class (and occasionally before class) & by e-mail to respond to student questions.

11. Syllabus:

The course syllabus complied with all requirements of the College of Law at the time and provided details on the plan for the course, as well as course expectations and contact information for the professor.

12. Analysis of course materials:

Course materials included assigned readings on Canvas. These included linked cases, statutes & articles relevant to the day's topic. Students were also asked to view some oral arguments at the Florida Supreme Court.

13. Other comments:

This was a very engaging class, and the professor was able to draw almost all of the students present into class discussion. The course included a mixture of federal and state materials involving the executive branch, and the professor was very knowledgeable about the subject of discussion.

The professor taught mainly socratically by questioning students, and a broad group of students volunteered answers or responded to earlier answers. The professor offered brief commentary.

The atmosphere of the class seemed conducive to the free discussion of the important issues and ideas relevant to the topic of the class. Both professor & students conducted themselves respectfully.

On a final note, the UF students performed at a very high level in the class discussion this reviewer attended. They were very familiar with the material, responded to questions freely & asked engaging questions. If this was typical of the class as a whole, the professor came away with a very good impression of the quality of UF law students.

The class also included an oral presentation as part of the final exam.

The syllabus was complete and clear, and each week of the course covered a different subject matter, and specific chapters in the Textbook

12. Analysis of course materials:

Reading materials include a textbook and the IRS code and regs, which students access through Bloomberg Tax.

13. Other comments:

Today's class focused on IRC section 704(c), Contributed Property. Prof. Jones started class by reminding his students that they could use Bloomberg Law tools to review statutes and regulations and showed them examples of how to do so. He also spent some time addressing how enforcement priorities for the rules had shifted between the previous and current administrations.

The discussion of 704(c) began with an overview of the rules, then proceeded to a review of the problems from the reading. Students participated in the discussion, and he paused regularly to see if there were any questions.

I particularly liked that he returned to the question of why contributed property was treated in a particular way, and how the students need to keep the purpose of the code and regs in mind when analyzing these contributions.

Overall, the class was successful. Prof. Jones covered the mechanics of the tax treatment of contributed property, the rationale for that treatment, the policy implications of the rules, and current enforcement trends. I believe that the students were engaged and felt comfortable with the discussion. Prof. Jones has an easy rapport with his students, and they seem to appreciate his style as well as the course's substance.

Prof. Jones is a professor at FAMU Law School and is very capable of teaching the class and working with students.

Darryll K. Jones is a Professor of Law. He previously served as the Director of Legal Clinics and Field Placement.

Jones assumed the duties of Interim Dean on July 1, 2015, after serving as Associate Dean for Academic Affairs since 2012. Jones joined the College of Law in July 2009 as Associate Dean for Research and Faculty Development. In that role, he helped to successfully guide FAMU Law through its first post-accreditation review. He received his LLM (Tax) and JD degrees from the University of Florida.

From 1993 to 2006 he taught at the University of Pittsburgh School of Law where he also served as Associate Dean for Academic Affairs from 2003 until 2006. From 2006 to 2009, Professor Jones served as Professor of Law at Stetson University College of Law where he was selected for the Homer & Dolly Hand Award for Excellence in Faculty Research and the Outstanding Faculty Service Award.

He is the author of “K-Rations” a column on partnership taxation appearing monthly in Tax Notes magazine and co-editor of the Nonprofit Law Professors Blog. Prior to becoming a full-time tax law scholar, Professor Jones served as General Counsel at Columbia College Chicago and Associate General Counsel at the University of Florida. He also served for five years in the United States Army Judge Advocate General’s Corp.

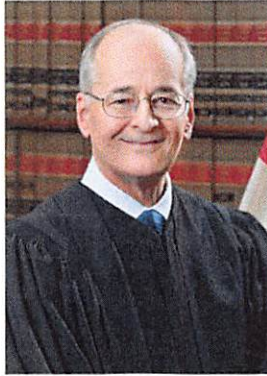

Current UF Law Promotion & Tenure Standard

Eligibility for promotion to Associate Professor requires that an Assistant Professor publish, or have accepted for publication, two single-author articles in a law review (primary or secondary) at an ABA-accredited law school or in a comparable academic journal.

Eligibility for promotion to Full Professor with tenure or for the grant of tenure at the rank of Associate Professor requires that a faculty member publish, or have accepted for publication, two additional such articles.

Proposed new UF Law Promotion & Tenure Standard

Eligibility for promotion to Associate Professor requires that an Assistant Professor publish, or have accepted for publication, two single-author articles or the intellectual equivalent, including coauthored articles, in a law review (primary or secondary) at an ABA-accredited law school or in a comparable academic journal. Eligibility for promotion to Full Professor with tenure or for the grant of tenure at the rank of Associate Professor requires that a faculty member publish, or have accepted for publication, two additional such articles.

Promotion candidates shall include a note with their application for promotion verifying their significant contribution to each article submitted. For every coauthored article submitted, the candidate shall specify their precise contribution, and the methodology used to determine the order of authors.

Current UF Law Post-Tenure Review Standard for “Exceeds Expectations”

Five or more high-quality, solo-authored articles, or the intellectual equivalent including coauthored articles, books, or other research products.

Note – The relevant language regarding co-authorship is identical for “exceeds expectations,” “meets expectations,” “does not meet expectations,” and “unsatisfactory.” The only difference is the number of articles for each category.
