Course Overview & General Guidelines

Welcome to Family Law! This course is designed for students who have an interest in becoming family law practitioners and those who want to begin mastering this bar tested subject. Regardless of your reason for taking this course, please keep in mind that we will be discussing sensitive and emotionally charged topics. Family law practitioners often deal with clients during the worst times of their lives, and often truly embody the role of a "counselor." As such, you should prepare to discuss sensitive topics and keep the following guidelines in mind:

- 1. It is never my intent to embarrass anyone. Should any of you need to talk to me privately about the topics we discuss in class, please do so. I understand if there are just some topics you do not wish to discuss for personal reasons and have no problem giving you a "pass" from actively participating in certain class discussions, as long as you let me know in advance.
- 2. All of you are coming from different backgrounds. You must be aware of this and be sensitive to the needs of others. No judgment of each other will be tolerated, but differing views of each other's opinions (including mine) is expected. Find a balance between both of those when commenting.
- 3. Always behave in a professional and appropriate manner.
- 4. Treat everyone with respect and courtesy.

Workload

This course complies with ABA Standard 310. You should plan to spend approximately 2 hours out of class reading and preparing class assignments for every 1 hour in class.

As for any three-credit course, the ABA requires that you spend an average of at least six hours per week on work for this course, <u>in addition to</u> time spent in class.

Learning Objectives and Outcomes

The learning objectives and expected outcomes of this Family Law Course are that students taking it will: (1) develop knowledge and understanding of substantive family law as well as of the various legal processes for dispute resolution; (2) possess the ability to perform legal analysis and reasoning and problem solving concerning Family Law, and to communicate such analysis, reasoning, and problem solving in written and in oral communication; and (3) gain understanding of proper professional and ethical responsibilities that attorneys engaged in family law practice have to clients and the legal system. This course will also include attention to professional skills needed for competent and ethical participation as members of the legal profession.

The Course Website

I will use the CANVAS course website for course related announcements, supplemental readings, as well as other course information. In addition, you will find optional readings and information about recent developments in family law relating to the subject matter examined in this course as well as opportunities related to family law. You should check CANVAS regularly and view it as an important course resource.

Attendance

I understand that things come up or sometimes you just need a mental health day. For that reason, you may take a maximum of two excused absences through the semester. For those days, you must request <u>and receive</u> the excused absence in advance (except in a true emergency).
